There are those who face life without a loved one; be it a spouse, a child, grandchild, or even a friend. Life is not the same with that special person not sitting at the table: or one we can sit down and talk to and find comfort is not there. We are told that life goes on, and it does; but the change seems so difficult and challenging. We might ask when will the emptiness in the heart and room every go away. Life goes on but it is a different life.

The same challenges continue that we faced on December 31st. There are the financial problems. Some economist predict a crash in the year to come. With the changing work force, some are forced to find new occupations to meet the financial needs of their families. With the cost of

food so high, how can I put food on the table for my family.

We know that our sins are forgiven; but we are haunted by the past, the wrongs we have done, the angry words spoken to hurt rather than build up. Sins that seem to be carried over into the New year. The story is told of two men talking at a party. We had differences with another person across the room. The friend said maybe you should forgive the person that hurt you. The friend agreed. We recall the trials and uncertainties that we face but also remember the Lord's promise, "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you. "And when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. For I am the Lord, your God.

When we become tired and weary because of the challenges of life we can remember the words of Isaiah, who wrote "Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles...' Jesus said, "Come unto me, you who are heavy laden and I will give you

rest."

When confronted by our sins, past and present, we can remember our Lord's words, "Be of good cheer. Your sins are forgiven." Isaiah wrote, "Though your sins are as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow."

We have been forgiven and can forgive as the Lord forgave us.

If we ever doubt that our God cares for us, understands what we go through, and has the compassion to help; we can look to the Baby who was laid in a manger at Bethlehem. He was Emmanuel, God with us. He experienced all that we experience, with the exception of sin, and has the power to help in every situation.

## PIPE ORGAN REPAIR & UPGRADE

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church's pipe organ was installed in 1978, and has provided our members and visitors with beautiful music as we have worshiped our gracious God for the last 46 years. During this period of time, the only maintenance has been a tuning periodically. During this time there have been no major problems.

Over the years, a relay has become charred and presents a serious fire hazard, this condition has existed for over 18 years. There is a problem with the memory in the organ, and recently one of the pedal springs broke and is being replaced. There are several other mechanical issues with our organ.

The Levsen Organ Company of Buffalo, Iowa, who has been tuning the organ, did a complete review of the organ's condition and has

made a number of recommendations which include: replacing the relay (which currently is a fire hazard), new stops on the existing pipes, a program to record the service and hymns in case the organist is gone, and a number of upgrades, which have come about over the years, which will improve our organ.

Total cost of the repair and upgrade of Prince of Peace Lutheran's organ will be \$85,000. This amount seems high, but we remember that there has been almost no expenditure for the organ over years, other than tuning.

The Church Council voted to recommend this expenditure pending approve by the voters of the congregation. This will be taken up at the Annual Voters Meeting following our worship service on January 14.

The Foundation has agreed to pay for the initial cost of \$85,000. Members of the congregation will be encouraged to contribute to the "Organ Repair and Upgrade Fund" which will reimburse the Foundation with the funds that are raised. Once the organ is repaired, we may have a special "Organ Recital" with the proceeds going to the fund.
