Greetings of joy and peace in the name of our risen Lord and victorious Savior, Jesus the Christ.

On one occasion, Michelangelo, the great artist, turned on his fellow artists in a spirit of indignation. He said: "Why do you keep filling gallery after gallery with endless pictures on the one theme of Christ in weakness, Christ on the Cross, and most of all, Christ hanging dead? Why do you concentrate on the passing episode as if it were the last work, as if the curtain dropped on Him with disaster and defeat? That dreadful scene lasted...a few hours. But to the unending eternity, Christ is alive; the stone has been rolled away and He rules and reigns and triumphs!" We move beyond agony of Good Friday, the confusion of Holy Saturday to the joyous celebration of the resurrection.

The message of Easter is dramatic, true, and life changing. The women came to the tomb on that early Sunday morning and were amazed at what they found and heard, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen! "Our Lord's resurrection transforms our lives as its meaning sinks into our hearts. The following story illustrates the meaning of Easter and the affect it can have on the lives of people.

Little Philip, born with Down's Syndrome, attended a third-grade Sunday School class with several eight-year-old boys and girls. Typical of that age, the children did not readily accept Philip with his differences. But because of a creative teacher, they began to care about Philip and accept him as part of the group, though not fully. The Sunday after Easter the teacher brought Leggs pantyhose containers, the kind that look like large eggs. Each receiving one, the children were told to go outside on that lovely day Spring day, find some symbol of new life, and put it in the egg-like container. Back in the classroom, they would share their new -life symbols, opening the containers one by one in surprise fashion. After running about the church property in wild confusion, the students returned to the classroom and placed the containers on the table. Surrounded by the children, the teacher began to open them one by one. After each one, whether flower, butterfly, or leaf, the class would ooh and ahh. Then one was opened, revealing nothing inside. The children exclaimed, "That's stupid, That's not fair. Somebody didn't do their assignment." Philip spoke up, "That's mine." Philip, you don't ever do things right! The students retorted, "There's nothing there!" "I did so do it..' Philip insisted, "I did do it. It's empty. The tomb was empty!" Silence followed. From then on Philp because a full member of the class. He died not long afterward from an infection most normal children would have shrugged off. At the funeral, his class of eight-year old's marched up to the altar not with flowers, but with their Sunday School teacher, each to lay on it an empty pantyhose egg.

Last month we were part of two completely different funerals. The first funeral was for a mother and daughter who were robbed of their lives

under terrible circumstances. The second funeral was for an 84 years old man who died in hospice with family at his side. Our Lord shed tears of sadness at both funerals. He also shed tears of joy when He received their souls to himself in heaven. The message was similar, but in many ways different because of the differing circumstances, death did not have the last word. Our Lord, the Lord of life and the living does. This is guaranteed by Jesus' resurrection.

The empty tomb proclaims that Jesus was risen. The empty tomb proclaims the power of Christ to transform lives. He comes to give life in the face and midst of death, hope in the midst of despair, and joy when confronted by sorrow. May our lives be transformed by the resurrected Christ.

The darkness of Good Friday has been replaced with the joy and hope of the empty tomb and our Lord's resurrection.

May the hope, joy and peace of Easter be yours now and throughout eternity. On behalf of Barb, Joy and Steve, Myka and Joslyn may you have a blessed and Christ filled Easter.

#### Our "Journey on to Heaven"

For the past few generations, Martin Luther, who was a pastor, theologian, author, hymnwriter, and professor, has been and continues to be one of the most referenced or quoted spiritual leaders of all time. Luther was a prolific writer, so he has a wealth of articles, books, and essays to quote. The following amazing paragraph from Luther does not reference the word stewardship or steward, but it conveys foundational truths of Christian stewardship.

Therefore, we must use all these things upon earth in no other way than as a guest who travels through the land and comes to a hotel where he must lodge overnight. He takes only food and lodging from the host, and he says not that the property of the host belongs to him. Just so should we also treat our temporal possessions, as if they were not ours, and enjoy only so much of them as we need to nourish the body and then help our neighbors with the balance. Thus, the life of the Christian is only a lodging for the night, since we have here no continuing city, but must journey on to heaven, where the Father is.

Martin Luther aptly points out that, while on earth, we are God's guests. God is the creator, sustainer, and owner of all things. Both the food we eat and the homes we live in are provided by God. God makes it possible for us to plant food to eat, because He provides the seeds, ground, sunlight, and rain. He gives us the intelligence, strength, and energy to harvest the crops that He makes possible for us to plant. The meat we eat comes from the animals that live in the fields which God has provided along with the food He makes possible for them to eat. God also provides the materials for our homes. Our lives are in God's hands. As His stewards, we receive His blessings with thanksgiving.

Luther's perspective on temporal possessions is totally opposite of what our society promotes. Our society tells us that we create and have control over all we have. Our happiness and security are dependent upon having things. Our status is determined by what we have so we work long and hard to have big homes, new cars, and large investment accounts. In contrast, Luther reminds us that things, both necessities and luxuries, are God gifts on loan to us. Luther encourages us to be satisfied with enough to provide for our needs and to use the rest to support our neighbors and God's kingdom.

Luther reminds us that "the life of the Christian is only a lodging for the night." Likewise, the Apostle Paul tells us that "our citizenship is in heaven" (Philippians 3:20), so we "press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14). Our earthly journey is merely temporary until we rest in our permanent home with Jesus. By God's grace, Luther knew that this life is a "journey on to heaven." We do as well.
