His pastoral duties caused him to preside at nearly 4500 burials in 1637 alone. In the context of this sad situation and these unfavorable circumstances he penned the words to "Now Thank We All Our God". It is a hymn of unconditional gratitude to God.

Now thank we all our God With heart and hands and voices Who wondrous things has done In whom His world rejoices

Thankful people don't have to have everything going their way to rejoice. No matter our circumstance in life this year, we can all pause and thank our gracious God for the blessings (spiritual and material) that He has given to us. Join us for our Service of Thanksgiving on Wednesday, November 25 and rededicate ourselves to being God's thankful people in all circumstances.

May our gracious Lord bless and keep each of you in His care as we give Him thanksgiving and praise. May you make this a blessed thanksgiving.

Giving Acceptable Gifts

The first act of giving from a person to God in God's Word is found in Genesis 4 when Cain and Abel gave their gifts to God. Both brothers gave gifts from their profits. Cain gave some of his crops, whereas Abel gave the firstborn of his flock and of the fat portion. "And the Lord had regard for Abel and his offering, but for Cain and his offering He had no regard" (Genesis 4:4b-5). God viewed their gifts differently. Abel's gift pleased God and Cain's did not.

In the Hall of Faith chapter, Hebrews 11, we read, "By faith Abel offered to God a more acceptable sacrifice than Cain, through which he was commended as righteous, God commended him by accepting his gifts. And through his faith, though he died, he still speaks" (Hebrews 11:4). So why was Abel's gift more acceptable than Cain's? Abel gave a better sacrifice not because of what he brought but because of his faith that prompted his gift. His gift was acceptable because of his motive for giving. God looks at the heart of the giver. Abel loved and trusted God and gave accordingly.

We demonstrate our faithfulness through what we give. Through faith, we give acceptable gifts. Knowing Who God is and what He has done for us through Jesus, we want to thank and praise Him with gifts that are acceptable and pleasing to Him. When we give God our first and best out of thankful hearts, God is pleased to receive them.

There are gifts we can give to God that are not acceptable. When we give token amounts and only go through the motion of giving, God is not pleased. If we give to God for tax purposes, for recognition, or give only our leftovers, God is dishonored. God wants our total devotion. When He has our hearts, we will make the effort to give our first and best in gratitude for Who God is and all He has done and continues to do for us.

As sinful people, we struggle in our efforts to give acceptable gifts. Our nature is to keep rather than to give. Left to ourselves, we would limit our giving to what is leftover rather than to make giving a priority. By God's grace, we acknowledge that He is the one Who has made it possible for us to earn an income, and He is the owner of all that we have. In essence, we are merely returning to Him what He has already given to us. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we are enabled to make giving a priority and to give generously. We seek to thank and honor Him by giving our heavenly Father acceptable gifts. God gave us the most acceptable gift of all when He sent His Son to the cross for our redemption and salvation. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Corinthians 9:15).
